

Doylestown High Wins 25 to 12; Farm School Tied, 0-0

Doylestown And Springfield Win Their Bux-Mont Games

Hornets Take Souderton, 25 to 12 as Jack Beatty Scored Twice — Poole and Fretz Cross for Six-Pointers and Beatty Gets a Conversion—Springers Beat Quakers, 40 to 0—Lansdale Over Hatboro, 32 to 6

(By G. R. Idrion) Doylestown High Hornets captured the second game of the current Bux-Mont Conference season on Saturday by defeating Dal Smoot's Souderton High gridiron, 25 to 12, on the Souderton gridiron.

It was a hectic game, far too hot for football, and especially for the players, although the extreme heat seemed to help the Indians, who actually played the best football they have shown in a long time against a Hornet eleven.

Doylestown got started early, scoring 13 points in the first quarter while the Indians failed to tally. Then the Indians reversed the dope and tallied a dozen counters—all they scored the rest of the game—in that second quarter. The Hornets rallied six points in the third and final quarters.

Fullback Jack Beatty was in rare form in this contest, as he scored two touchdowns for the Hornets and placed a conversion to 13 of the winning points. Bob Poole and Captain Everett Fretz accounted for the other two Hornet touchdowns. For the Indians, Gerhart and Delp scored six-pointers.

In first downs, Doylestown and Souderton were even with six apiece. The Hornets attempted five passes and completed three, while the Indians attempted eight and completed six. Doylestown's scoring was recorded in the following touchdown order: Poole, Beatty, Fretz and Beatty. An intercepted pass resulted in one Souderton score.

Doylestown's first score was the result of power plays right down the field in a steady march after the kickoff, ending with a touchdown pass to Poole. Right Guard Bucher's blocking of a Souderton kick also paved the way for a Hornet touchdown.

Subs that saw action in the Souderton-Hornet game included Conroy, Fisher, Newman, Corchran, Swartz, Rufe, Able and Fluck. Coach Warren Gockley's Springfield High School champions made it two straight in the Bux-Mont Scholastic Conference by running rough-shod over Quakertown High School, 40-0, at Quakertown Saturday.

Quarterback Jack Roatche sparked the Springers' attack by scoring three of their six touchdowns, going across for his second after a 45-yard run on a shuttle pass-play.

Lansdale easily defeated Hatboro, 32-6. The outstanding play came in the fourth period when Carl Polidoro intercepted a Hatter pass and ran 60 yards to score.
