

Aggies Roll to Fifth Win Over Gallaudet, 13-0

Thompson Passes, Runs For Two TD's

WASHINGTON, D. C. — The National Aggies defeated Gallaudet College 13 to 0 Saturday before a homecoming crowd of over 500.

The first scoring came in the opening minutes of the second period as quarterback Skip Thompson passed to Halfback Jack Holzapfel from the 12.

As the first quarter ended, a long pass from Thompson from his own 33-yard line skipped over the head of the intended Aggie receiver, through the hands of two would-be interceptors, and was finally caught by back Harry Conover, who took it to the Gallaudet 15. Thompson pushed ahead to the 12 and on third down, passed to Holzapfel for the score. Wayne Hoffner booted the extra point.

The Aggies almost scored again in the second period, getting as far as the 3. After punting from the Gallaudet 43-yard line a penalty on roughing the kicker was called, giving the Aggies a first down and bringing the ball up to the 23-yard line. Thompson again passed to Holzapfel, who took it within three yards of the goal, as the half ended.

Skip Thompson received the opening kickoff in the second half, running it back 18 yards to the Aggies 35. On the next play, halfback Sid Blair pushed on to the 40 and Skip Thompson, on a perfectly maneuvered end run, streaked downfield 60 yards for the second Aggie TD. Hoffner's conversion was wide.

Gallaudet's only real threat was in the final period as quarterback Frank LaRosa passed to Paul Bradford from the 50-yard line. Bradford caught it in the 25 but fumbled, with Gallaudet recovering on the A-18.

The Aggie line held, however, and N. A. C. took over on downs. Jack Holzapfel, on the next play, broke through center for 33 yards, ending the game.

The Aggies covered 192 yards on the ground with Holzapfel accounting for 89 and Thompson 64. Gallaudet netted 39. In the air attack, Thompson completed 6 out of 11 for 173 yards; Gallaudet's Frank LaRosa, 4 out of 16 for 79 yards.

Skip Thompson still holds second place in district college scoring with 45 points. Swarthmore's Tom S-Min is first with 46.

The victory was the fifth for the Aggies this year, against one loss and one tie. Four of the five were shutouts.

Penndel's 19-point first quarter spree sparked the Aces to a 26-0 victory yesterday afternoon in a Big Six Conference game played on the winners' field.

The Penndel win, coupled with Lansdale's 15-0 loss to league-leading Willow Grove on Saturday, moved the Aces into second place in league standings. The A. C.'s, with a 1-5-0 record, remained in fifth place.

In the other Big Six game played yesterday, Sell-Perk tied Souderton, 7-7.

Tony Fizzano sparked Penndel to its fourth win, against two losses and a tie, with a three-touchdown scoring spree. Vic Gring, ex-Neshaminy star, scored Penndel's other TD, while Bunny Anderson booted two out of four extra points.

Fizzano Scores
Penndel took the opening kickoff and drove right down the field for the first score, Fizzano climaxing the drive by circling right end for the TD. Anderson's kick for the point was good.

The A. C.'s took the kickoff and started a short drive, aided by Jack Morgan's 14-yard scamper. But a fumble gave Penndel the ball on the 40. A series of running plays moved the ball into scoring position, where Gring took a pitchout for the touchdown. Anderson's kick was off, making it 13-0.

In the same period, the A. C.'s fumbled in their own territory. Penndel recovering Fizzano again went around end for the score. Anderson missed the point, making the score 19-0 going into the second frame.

In the next two periods neither club could get started, although the A. C.'s Jim Swartz got off a pair of good gains.

Penndel Drives
In the final period, Penndel opened a drive on its 40, which resulted in the fourth TD when Fizzano went through tackle for the score. Anderson's kick was good, making it 26-0.

Taking the kickoff, Bunky Heaton got off the finest run of the afternoon for the A. C.'s when he went

through tackle for 35 yards. But the locals were forced to punt.

Near the end of the game, the A. C.'s put on their best drive. Morgan went 18 yards on an end run, and Bruce West tossed a 15-yard pass to Nelson for 15 more yards.

But the drive stalled on the enemy 10, shortly before the end of the game.

Group Still Hopes To Save Athletics

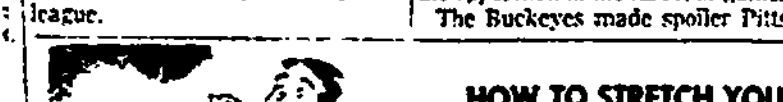

Eagles Still Tied with Giants

NEW YORK (INS)—They're still running neck and neck in the eastern conference but the pre-race favorite, Detroit, is all alone in front of the western pack going into the home stretch of the pro football season.

The New York Giants broke the log jam in the eastern division Sunday by upsetting Pittsburgh, 30 to 6, and sending the Steelers down to fourth place behind Cleveland.

The Philadelphia Eagles remained tied with the Giants 5-2, snapping their two-game losing streak against the Chicago Cardinals, 30 to 14.

Detroit toyed with Baltimore, 27 to 3, Saturday night but San Francisco failed to keep pace Sunday and was dropped out of a tie with the world champion Lions, 42 to 34, by Los Angeles.

Browns in Rout
The Cleveland Browns pulled to within one game of tying the Giants and Eagles by smashing the Washington Redskins, 62 to 3. And the Chicago Bears dropped Green Bay into fifth place Los Angeles by nosing out the Packers, 23 to 23.

The Giants, who face the Eagles in a showdown Sunday, played their best game of the year before the capacity crowd of 36,338 at Forbes Field.

Charley Conerly rattled the Steeler defenses, completing 13 of 20 passes for 137 yards and three touchdowns. The Giants, who gained 245 yards on the ground, capitalized on the breaks, turning two pass interceptions by Em Tunnel and a Steeler fumble into TD's. Pitt's Lynn Chandross suffered fractured ribs.

Thomson Hot
The Eagles had equally edgy passing from quarterback Bobby Thomson, who completed 14 of 24 for 230 yards and three touchdowns. Doak Walker kicked two field goals for Detroit, Harley Sewell fell on a TD fumble in the end zone for a TD and Bill Bowman and Hunchy Hoernschmeyer ran for the touchdowns.

A capacity crowd of 61,000 watched the Rams' Norm Van Brocklin pass to three touchdowns and steer the visitors to three others on the ground against San Francisco. George Ratterman, subbing for

Quarterback George Blanda connected on a seven-yard touchdown pass to Johnny Hoffman with two minutes to play for the Bears' win over Green Bay.

UCLA Takes Over No. 1 Position Among Nation's College Squads

NEW YORK (INS)—Unbeaten UCLA, prohibited from repeating this year in the Rose Bowl, prepared to settle for the mythical national championship today after replacing Oklahoma as college football's No. 1 team.

The undefeated Sooners, who withstood assaults on their first-place ranking for eight successive weeks, dropped out of the lead and into third place Sunday as International News Service's six-man panel of experts voted the Bruins in front by four points over Ohio State.

The UCLAs, who lead the country's powerhouse with eight victories and an astronomical 333 points, received four first-place designations from the panel and one vote for second to amass 58 points on a 10-9-3-etc. basis.

The unbeaten Buckeyes, in third place last week, nosed Oklahoma out for the runnerup spot by six points.

40 Per Game
The UCLAs, scoring better than 40 points a game while running through San Diego, Kansas, Maryland, Washington, Stanford, Oregon State, California and Oregon, eclipsed a school season-scoring record Saturday when they smashed Oregon, 41 to 0.

The Pacific Coast conference Giants handied the west's top offensive star, George Shaw, for a total gain of 29 yards and clicked off their 201st point against six for the opposition in the last four games. The Buckeyes made spoiler Pitts-

burgh their seventh straight victory, 25 to 0, while Oklahoma outclassed Iowa State, 40 to 0.

Navy 8th
Navy broke into the top ten for the first time, nailing down the No. 8 ranking with a convincing 50 to 7 victory over Duke. And Iowa came back to the select group, slipping into ninth place on the strength of a 25 to 14 victory over Purdue. The defeat dropped the Boilermakers out of the rankings along with Miami (Fla.), which lost its first, 14 to 13, to Auburn.

Arkansas squeezed Notre Dame out of fourth place by a single point on the basis of its 23 to 15 victory over rugged Rice and the Irish dropped into fifth place although drubbing winless Penn, 42 to 7.

Army held fast in sixth place with a one-sided 48 to 7 win over previously unbeaten Yale. Southern California moved up a notch into seventh by whipping Stanford, 21 to 7, and Mississippi clung to the No. 10 spot with a 51 to 0 triumph over Memphis State.

Baylor Wins
Baylor surprised Texas, 13 to 7, in Saturday's TV feature. Most notable of the upsets were Miami Ohio 6, Indiana 0, and North Carolina 21, South Carolina 19.
